

Programs & Outreach

Citizens of Birmingham can connect with information throughout the library system. In fact, 2,572 programs, including storytimes, lectures, musical performances, etc., were held for children, adults and teens at our 21 library locations - 354 more than last year.

Use of Library Resources

- BPL patrons checked out 1,434,350 books, videos, CDs, and works of art
- BPL has 148,644 library card holders, an increase of 2.24% over the previous year
- 1,571 people on average enter the Central Library each day, 47,839 each month, and 574,070 for the year making it the most visited cultural institution in Jefferson County
- The library's free public access computers were used by 671,537 people
- Library meeting rooms were used for 2,482 community meetings

Special Collections

- 1,945 researchers received assistance in the Department of Archives and Manuscripts a new record and an increase of 3.5% over the previous year
- Researchers in the Archives used 87,788 files, scrapbooks, architectual drawings, photographs, and other historic documents — an increase of 22,990 over the previous year
- Researchers came from 5 different countries and 33 states to use these resources



Respect for the Past, Foundation for the Future A Project in the Southern History Department

To insure proper security and accessibility of all valuable resources, BPL began the task of conducting a complete inventory of the world-renowned collection of the Southern History Department and Rare Book Room. During the past year, the staff has addressed the following issues:

- Reconfigured the department so that books and other materials are shelved in an organized and accessible layout
- Updated the online catalog to match existing holdings
- Cataloged 1308 additional items and bound over 1300 loose periodicals
- Inventoried 1800 pamphlets purchased between 1979 and 1989 and determined approximately half not found in any other library



- With permission from the Birmingham News and Birmingham Post-Herald, moved forward the project to digitize the library's clipping files dating from the early 20th century. These resources now viewable on the library's web site
- Replaced 2100 reels of severely deteriorated microfilm of local newspapers covering the years 1888-1975
- Spent over \$250,000 to preserve local history and genealogy materials
- Initiated Historical Voices, a new project to capture the oral histories of Birmingham citizens
- Produced a report on this project and presented it to the Birmingham Genealogical Society and other local groups



Self Service Initiative

- Began allowing library patrons to reserve books and other items using the online web catalog
- Reserved items now placed on accessible shelving where patrons may retrieve the requested material at their convenience
- Coin-operated, print-release stations established at Central and the four regional libraries
- Library Book Store now self-service, open the same hours as the library, and allowing payment at the front desk when bookstore volunteers and staff not available
- Initiated self checkout at the Central Library, and at the Five Points West and Springville Road branches



Technology

Today's library depends on tools that would astonish users only a couple of decades ago. Improvements to these resources are ongoing and in the past year included the following:

- Upgraded the computer network operating system using the latest Microsoft Active Directory configuration for better security of staff and public PCs
- Replaced Internet filtering software with the newest generation
- Added SPAM filtering for all incoming staff e-mail
- Installed 167 new PCs throughout the county and installed 21 new PCs in the Regional Library Computer Center bringing the total inventory countywide to 1,022 computers
- Rewired and upgraded network equipment in the Central Library East Building
- Installed wireless access (WiFi hotspots) for the public in the Central library
- Adapted public PCs to allow use of USB flash drives
- Identified and began training 75 Computer Services Liaisons (CSLs) among library staff to assist in keeping hundreds of PCs up, running and available for the public
- Bright House Productions installed free cable connections at all BPL locations for data transmission





Telling The Library's Story

The library makes sure that the citizens of Birmingham know about its resources and services. In 2005, the Public Relations Department designed and developed more than 600 pieces of promotional literature. The library also worked with partners to distribute the information to all the citizens of Birmingham.

- Replaced the adult services desk and the interior circulation desk at North Birmingham Regional Branch
- Replaced HVAC units at Pratt City, North Avondale and Wylam Branches

- Received \$112,000.00 from neighborhoods, organizations and individuals for library programs and renovations
- Central Library named "Top Tourist Attraction" for the City of Birmingham according to the Birmingham Business Journal's Book of Lists
- Archives Department named a repository for the Library of Congress Veteran's History Project
- BPL's Archivist assisting in the development of an online encyclopedia -Encyclopedia of Alabama
- Received First Place for the Department of Youth Services Youth First initiative; First Place in the Government category for NCCJ's Walk As One campaign; and Third Place for the Department of Youth Services Feed the Need campaign
- Staff was recognized for increasing their giving to the United Way by 42.4% over the previous year
